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## Just poaching?

When Mozambican coastguards arrested a South African fishing vessel, the *Plumstead*, inside Mozambican territorial waters, it was close to the island of Inhaca, just across the bay from Maputo. It was registered in Durban and was the property of a company called B.H. Prigge.

The log made the Plumstead's route quite clear. Captain Jan Smit and his 18-man crew had made straight for the Monte Belo fishing grounds near the mouth of the Limpopo River, well inside Mozambican waters. It was apparently a very simple case of poaching; the case was heard late last year and the captain was fined \$27,000 (which will presumably be paid by the boat-owners). The Plumstead itself was confiscated.

But one intriguing detail raises awkward questions.

was not fishing, after all.
